The seminar is organised to commemorate the 20th anniversary of Chernobyl disaster. The impact of the Chernobyl disaster is still visible in Belarus and Ukraine, however the possible impact of this disaster on other European countries is also discussed.

The Otto Hugo Institute of Radiology in Munich has been providing medical and humanitarian aid to the victims in parts of Belarus for 15 years. The institute has organised more than 140 humanitarian expeditions to the areas affected by the radioactivity. The South Bohemian Mothers want to inform the Czech public of the impact of the Chernobyl disaster within this project. Another objective is the setting up the cooperation between the Czech scientific community and the Otto Hugo Institute in the medical sphere - medical stays of doctors in Belarus and the provision of medicine for those suffering from thyroid cancer, etc.
